Main idea Any piece of writing is written because the author

(writer) wants to tell us something. That will be the main

idea of the paragraph or article.

Ask yourself: "What does the author want to tell me in this paragraph?"

Fact

A fact is something that has been proven to be correct.

Example: The Sun gives light and heat to the Earth.

Opinion An opinion has not been proven and may or may not be

true.

Example: The Blue Bulls rugby team will win on Saturday.

Fresh Water - an Essential Resource

Water is needed for survival, that's why every drop counts. South Africa will not have any fresh water available by 2030, according to scientists. We have to start thinking differently about water and how we are going to save and protect water.

South Africa has access to a lot of sea water, but sea water is salty. Sea water can only be used by humans and animals if the salt is removed from the water. This is possible, but very expensive.

Most of the fresh water we use in our homes, comes from rivers. If we keep on polluting and poisoning our rivers, we will eventually not have enough fresh water to use.

The LifeStraw

The LifeStraw was developed by Mr Frandsen. This <u>device</u> is designed to kill off <u>bacteria</u> and to <u>improve</u> the taste of water.

LifeStraw is especially useful in countries that do not have enough safe drinking water. <u>Diarrhoea</u>, among other <u>illnesses</u>, is spread through <u>contaminated</u> drinking water and is the cause of death of about 1,5 million children a year worldwide.



When you suck water through the <u>remarkable</u> LifeStraw, the water is cleaned and tastes better.

Language in Context

Common Nouns

A common noun is something that you can see and touch. It is either a thing, a place, a person or an animal.

Examples: table, chair, teacher, dog, man

Proper Nouns

A proper noun is a name that is given to something, e.g. to people, animals, towns, streets, books, movies, places, etc.

Proper nouns are always written in capital letters.

Examples: John, Centurion, Atterbury Road
